“Co-designed with our First Nations and multicultural communities, I am delighted the new artworks will create a welcoming environment of healing, support, comfort and wellbeing for patients, staff and carers for many years to come,” Sonia said.

The First Nations art works, a digital screen featuring the captivating Burbangana work, and a suspended sculpture, will be displayed in the new entry foyer on Goulburn Street.

The wall graphics, spanning across five floors of the new building, reflect the diverse


culture of Liverpool and the themes of belonging and culture.

All the arts installations have been co-designed with local First Nations and multicultural communities and explore the ideas of resilience, journeys, nature, family, and connection.

At the showcase, Sonia introduced and thanked the talented creative teams and artists involved in the project. These include the City People, ZakPage and Barahanos Byrne teams and community artists Federico Rekowski, Kevser Ugurlu, Kevin Vo and Yasameen Albo, from migrant and refugee backgrounds.

Encouraging female participation in STEM



A year on since its successful launch, Johnstaff Projects recently kicked off its second year of STEM programs, aimed at inspiring and encouraging greater female participation in the property and construction industry.

The first of four sessions to be delivered this year focused on architecture including the design process, and cost management at Lendlease's Buraga Gul Skilling and Employment Hub.

The group of Year 9 students also heard from a variety of industry leaders including corporate health, engineering, communications, and project directors about the challenges and opportunities that a career in the industry may present.

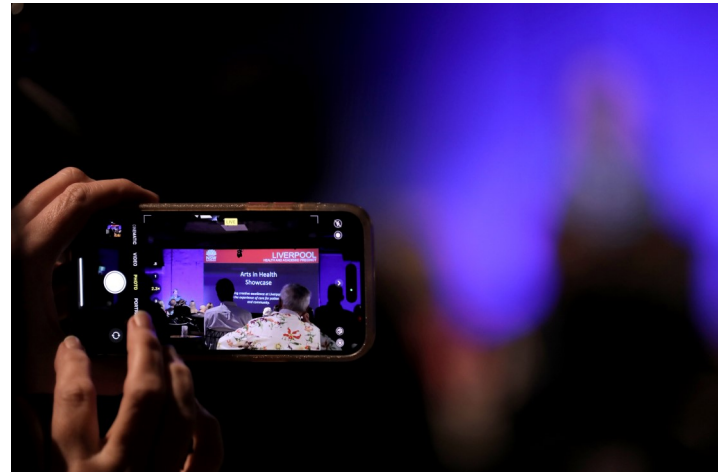


Reaching out
